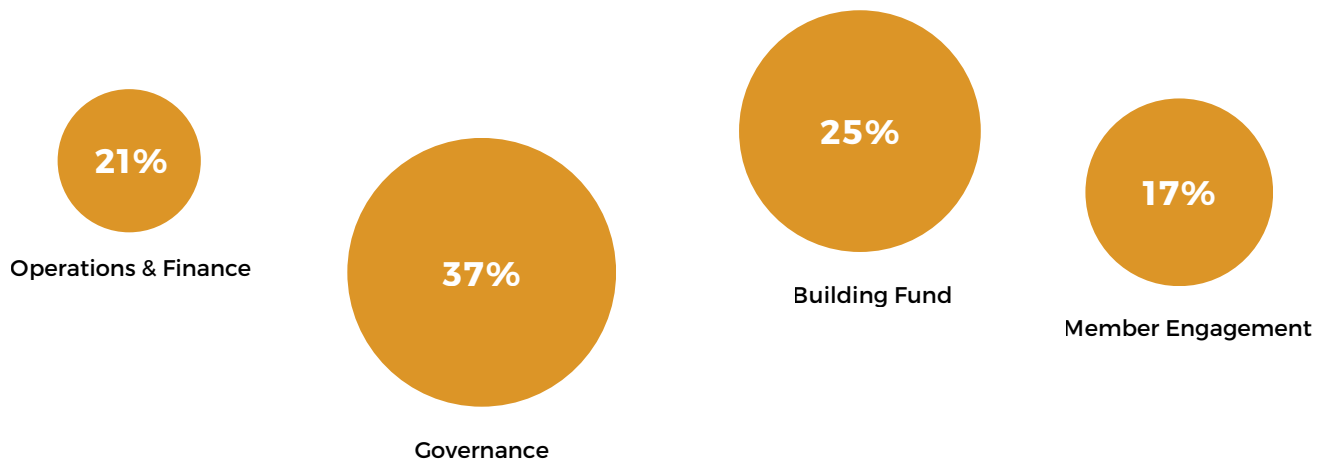

General Election Results

For the 2025/2026 Year



The General Election for the 2025/2026 year was held between Tuesday, February 26 and Thursday, March 6. 8 (eight) candidates put their names forward for 12 (twelve) vacant positions on Student Council. 1 (one) candidate for the role of President, 2 (two) for Vice President Academic, and 3 (three) for Vice President External. Voting was available on MyRDP between Monday, March 3 and Thursday, March 6. With a **record-breaking voter turnout of 23.2%**, Bridget Anderson, Vishal Arora, Nicholas Baker, Criselda Co, Lyan Jazleen Fajardo, Yiri Olueh-Matimi, Esther Owolagba, and Varun LNU were elected to Student Council. Jacq Patterson was elected as President, Eli Wolters as Vice President Academic, and Samuel Johannson as Vice President External - they took office on May 1, 2025.

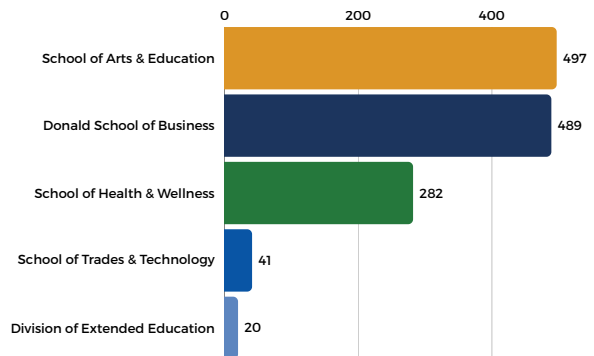

Advocacy

In March 2024, the Students' Association Council adopted the Association's long-term advocacy priorities. These long-term goals would provide the Association with clear objectives and would continue to honor the Association's 60-year history of representation and advocacy. The advocacy goals were enacted on May 1, 2024.

The 2023/2024 Student Council was tasked with creating advocacy goals divided into three objectives:

1. Determine the priorities of the students of Red Deer Polytechnic.
2. Create a framework that will ensure continuity of advocacy work year-to-year.
3. Ensure continuity of advocacy and representation.

Advocacy priorities were shared with Red Deer Polytechnic's Executive Leadership team and included recommendations to RDP.

The advocacy priorities and recommendations were:

Increase Indigenous Spaces on Campus

1. Create an Indigenous Medicine Garden on campus.
2. Install a permanent Tipi on campus.

Transitional Support for International Students

1. As international students need time and safety not only adjust to RDP's policies, culture, and environment but Red Deer and Canada's as well, RDP should have three-month transitional housing for International students who choose not to live in RDP's residence to reside when they first arrive at RDP. This will give them time to adjust, build a community, and find a safe place to live for their remaining time at RDP.

Open Educational Resources

1. Develop Institutional Policy for selection of Course Instructional Material that states that the adoption or the creation of OER's must be the first choice of Instructors when selecting supplemental material for their courses.
2. Create a dedicated grant for Instructors to give them the time and resources to research and create OERs.

Centralization of Student Supports

1. The existing student supports and services on campus be relocated to a centralized and/or localized location.

Student Supports at RDP to be included in the centralized and/or localized hub:

- Intake Coordinators (currently in room 1006 – Library)
- Counseling Services (currently in room 1402)
- Accessibility Services (currently in 1006 – Library)
- Health and Wellbeing Services (Currently room 901)
- Student Connect Center (currently room 1102), including Academic Advising, Funding Advising, Scholarships and Awards Information, and Emergency Student Food Bank Intake.
- Career Services/advising offered by CEED (currently in room 1204)

Advocacy Cont.

Mental Wellness: Identifying the Capacity of Staff and Faculty

1. RDP should initiate a mechanism to determine the roles, expectations, and limitations of staff and faculty as it relates to student mental health. The chosen mechanism should have the goal of understanding the needs of staff and faculty as they support their students, identifying ways to support faculty with classroom management, identifying gaps in current support offerings, giving staff and faculty the skills to identify which student services and supports to direct the student in need to, and providing professional development and supports for staff and faculty to support their own mental health and the mental health of their peers and students.
2. Those who interact with students daily are in an ideal position to recognize and respond to early indicators of concern. Every member of the RDP community should be fully aware of all supports and services on campus that are available to the students, staff, and faculty.

Investment in the Sustainable Development Goals Accord

1. Create a dedicated SDG Committee with a Terms of Reference and a budget line that is empowered to research, advocate for, produce programming and initiatives, and more for the Sustainable Development Goals on Campus.
2. Create a research fund for students and faculty for projects focused on one or more of the Sustainable Development Goals.
3. Create a grant or scholarship for students who have demonstrated excellence and/or innovation towards one or more of the Sustainable Development Goals.

Language Course Offerings

1. Canada's Truth and Reconciliation Commission calls upon "post-secondary institutions to create university and college degree and diploma programs in Indigenous languages". This can start by RDP offering credit courses and credentials in Indigenous languages.
2. Continue to add to the existing French Courses with the addition of Intermediate and Advanced Courses.
3. Explore the return of Spanish language courses and offer additional foreign language courses such as Korean, Japanese, German, etc. to RDP's course offerings.



Key Accomplishments

Food Security Grant

In June 2024, we received a \$50,000 Food Security Grant from the Government of Alberta to address the growing demand of food insecurity on our campus.

Truth & Reconciliation Commission of Canada's (TRC) Calls to Action

As a commitment to learning about and implementing the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's (TRC) Calls to Action, as well as ongoing recognition of our history, the Association installed vinyl posters of the 11 Calls to Action related to Post-Secondary institutions in the Association stairwell for individuals to view, learn from, and reflect on.

Grants, Sponsorship & Donations

We were successful in securing \$26,000 in grants, sponsorship, and donations to support our mental health initiatives and Peer Support programming.

Peer Lounge

We successfully advocated to Red Deer Polytechnic to provide us with additional space on campus to support the ongoing development of a Peer Support program. 2002A, formerly the Kines Meeting Room, was offered to us, and the Peer Lounge was located in The Loft.



Special Projects

Kaleidoscope Pride Mural

On Friday, August 16th, we gathered to unveil the beautiful mural, titled Kaleidoscope, that had recently been painted on the exterior of the Far Side Bar & Grill. SARDP commissioned RDP Visual Art alum, Kat Simmers, for the project.

We visibly display our continued commitment to the 2SLGBTQIA+ community as Kaleidoscope symbolizes unity, acceptance, and the strength found in diversity, and that Red Deer Polytechnic is a safe and inclusive campus, where all are welcome.

Kaleidoscope was a partnership between SARDP, Pride on Campus, and Red Deer Polytechnic.



Orange Shirt Day T-Shirt Design

In collaboration with Indigenous Student Initiatives and Red Deer Polytechnic, we launched the Orange Shirt Day T-Shirt Design Contest in July 2024. RDP students and alumni were invited to submit their original t-shirt designs that reflect the spirit and message of Orange Shirt Day. The selected design would be featured on the Orange Shirt Day t-shirt, which will be available for purchase on campus in September. All proceeds from the t-shirt sales will go towards supporting the Indigenous Student Bursary.

At the end of August we unveiled, Cori Steele's design (RDP student.) The Orange Shirts were available for purchase in The Lift.

199 Orange Shirts were sold, raising \$2985 for the Indigenous Student Bursary.



Sustainable Development Goals Accord

The SARDP Sustainable Development Goals Ad-hoc Committee was formed in October 2024, with the first meeting being held in November. In December, the Committee surveyed key members of the Association Staff, and surveyed the Membership in February. Following the closure of both surveys, the Committee reviewed the data and curated a final report.

The Committee would develop an implementation plan for the Association and provide recommendations to Red Deer Polytechnic. As the SDGs were designed for Nations, we may not always fit/align with one or more of the goals; however, the Committee has been tasked with deciphering whether the goals make sense at an organizational and institutional level, and advocating for change where necessary.

In April 2024, the Association Council voted to approve the SDG Committee as a standing committee of Council, and gave direction that a Terms of Reference should be created to address recommendations #2 and #3.

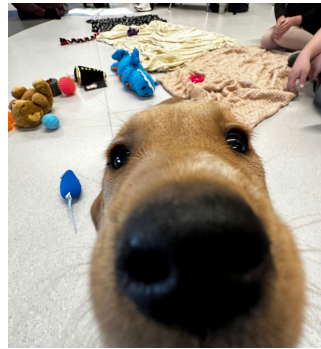

CAT Fund

The Cultural Activities Trust Fund (CAT Fund) helps fund cultural events held on campus. Both students and faculty contribute to the fund and sit on the committee to review and approve subsidy applications.

This year, CAT Fund assisted the Agora Conference, Student Science Conference, Psychology Symposium, and the RDP Research Showcase, and collectively provided them with \$12,260 in funding.

SIP

SIP (Student Initiatives Program) helps fund events to showcase leadership, help our members grow personally and professionally, and foster new initiatives while promoting change. We proudly supported Alia Markham to attend the 12th Canadian Developmental Biology Conference. Alia received \$300.00 to attend.



Emergency Student Food Bank

Our student-run emergency food bank is one of our busiest services on campus and this year, we saw an increase in demand. In 2024/2025, we fed 1298 students and their families with 574 hampers. When compared to 2023/2024, we fed 773 students and their families with 535 food hampers.

We rely on the kindness of donors from the institution as well as the greater Red Deer area. We have food bank donation cans in the Lift and Far Side Bar & Grill, and we accept donations on our website and over the phone. We collected \$24,770.84 in Emergency Student Food Bank Donations. In addition, we received \$50,000 Food Security Grant from the Government of Alberta.

The Soup Program began in 2019/2020 and later expanded to include pasta. Each purchase of soup and pasta at the Far Side Grill is sold on a "pay-what-you-can" basis, and each dollar spent is put towards our Emergency Student Food Bank. This year, the Soup & Pasta Program donated \$2,923.66 to the cause.

Food donations were collected at the World Religions Conference, Trades Holiday Pancake Breakfast, United We Weigh campaigns, and other initiatives.

We are grateful to those who donated and made a difference to our students.

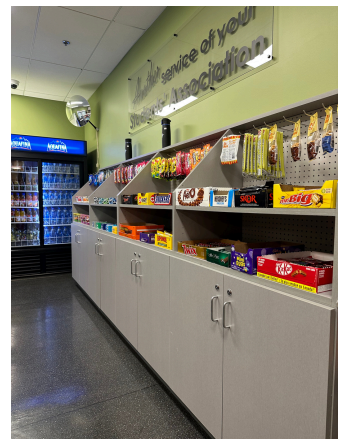
